10. Changing a tire

One step is listed on each note card.

Students are in groups of four.

Each group of students are given the steps face down.

Each student picks an equal amount of cards. Students may look at own cards.

Students then place card face up on the table. The first step is placed first.

If all students agree that the card placed first is actually first they may proceed.

If not, the student who placed it, picks it up and another attempts the first step.

11. Social Climate of Driving

Students walk around room for a bit in a circle. Ask students to stop and ask how they are feeling?

Students pick a card and maneuver the way indicated on the card. They still walk in the circle.

12. Brain storm relay

In small groups, students one at a time approach the paper on the wall writing one answer. This is a relay with a start line and a finish line. Only one student may approach and answer at a time.

13. Stare

Students line up facing a partner. One line turns around and faces opposite direction so they are no longer looking at their partners.
