Driver's Ed Class is Over—What Now? By Lora Poser-Brown (Lewistown)

When class has been completed and students now must spend the six month practice time, here is a sample letter from the Lewistown program that tries to encourage parents to take the practice time seriously as well as include the information to questions that will be asked when the students go to the DMV appointment in six months. Permission has been give to use the following letter and customize it to individual programs around the state.

Congratulations! Your student successfully completed Driver's Education! Many of you now wonder what the next steps are.

- 1. Continue to practice with your new driver regularly. Keep calm. If you get anxious or angry, they will not drive better.
 - a. A special note about **speed**: I am aware that most drivers go 1-5 MPH over the limit, but this is illegal and the **DMV will fail someone during the drive test for it**. At this point, students need to focus on building habits of following the law.
- 2. Continue filling out the hours log for the next 5+ months. Whoever the licensed supervising driver is, they need to initial for that drive on the sheet (may be different if using an app).
- 3. Look on the back of the log for instructions about the GDL (graduated driver's license).
- 4. Use the teen driver agreement (or make a new one that suits your family better).
- 5. Two or three months before your student is ready to get their GDL (earliest possible date is Jan 5, 2023), go online to https://dojmt.gov/driving/appointments/ and schedule them for a license WITH DRIVE TEST appointment. You'll find out when arriving for the appointment if they have been waived for the drive test. Note; I have no idea, nor does Mr. Gruener, nor does the local DMV know prior to then who will be required to take the drive test.
 - a. Notes about the test: see 1.a from above about speed. Require your student to make complete stops (stop at or before the line or sign, whichever is first, feel the car settle, count to TWO as they scan the intersection, then put car in motion.) The "creep and peep" method we teach in class is legal just make sure they creep and peep after making their complete stop. And lastly, practice parallel parking. Make it part of each drive your student takes you on.
 - b. Your student's learner's permit is good for twelve months. I believe your student's will expire on July 11, 2023. If they do not get a license prior to then, they will have to take both the knowledge test and the drive test at the DMV when ready to obtain a license.
- 6. This summer's students can all tell you the following. They are most likely in all of their driving years to get in a wreck in their first two years of driving regularly. **Have firm expectations about responsibility, caution, safe behaviors, and positive habits.** Follow the GDL laws with your student to reduce their risk of an accident (a majority of teen accidents occur when it is dark and/or when they have multiple passengers).
 - a. To see how some behaviors dramatically increase your risk of an accident, look at https://www.impactteendrivers.org/pixpopup-item/wheel-of-death/. Our students used this in class and were surprised.
- 7. Included with this letter is your student's Certificate of Completion. Show it to your vehicle insurance provider in case they offer a discount or require it for coverage of your student.

How to Correctly Complete Revised MVD Application

In August of this year, a revised version of the MVD application was approved and established as the form to use until further notice. Links to the new applications and the full version of this notice can be found on the OPI website at opi.mt.gov/driver ed under the Driver Educator tab. The yellow sheets that were approved in October of 2018 are no longer being accepted. I will try my best to explain what you need to do to make these applications accurate for the local MVD stations.

Everything written on the entire application needs to be done in **blue or black ink**.

LICENSING QUESTIONS: 1-5 all need to be marked. Most likely all will be marked "No". If they mark any "Yes", the student will need to have a Driver Medical Evaluation filled out for that question they marked "Yes". The student will need to bring the completed form with them when they go into the local MVD after the course. By doing this, the student will not need to make another trip back to the MVD after getting the form filled out by a doctor or medical professional validating the student's ability to drive. If there is something marked "Yes" and the student does not have the medical form filled out with them at their appointment, the MVD will give them the form and student will need to make another appointment with the completed form. If you have any students that have disabilities that fit those questions, give those students this medical form to get a professional's approval for that student to drive with you. Ultimately, it is your decision whether you feel safe to be in a moving vehicle with these students.

FOR MINOR APPLICANTS ONLY: The parent and instructor sign at or before the parent meeting.

<u>VISION TEST</u>: Either "Without glasses" or "With glasses/contacts" needs to be circled. Then a simple "Pass" or "Fail" next to the "Left Eye", "Both Eyes", and "Right Eye" has to be done. I was told not to worry about the Color Perception or Depth. Below is an example of what will be accepted. A pass is considered 20/40 in each and both eyes.

Left Eye (pass) Both Eyes (pass) Right Eye (pass)

HEARING TEST: If an applicant is deaf, wears a hearing aid, or is hard of hearing, the applicant's license must have a left outside rear-view mirror restriction.

Flip the sheet over to the back side of the form.

OTHER SERVICES OFFERED:

- 1. Only needs to be marked if the student is 18 or 19.
- 2. This question can be marked by Traffic Education students. It's their decision on "Yes" or "No".
- 3. "Exempt" or if the student is 18 or 19 they can decide what to put.

APPLICANT: The student will need to sign and date.

<u>VOTER REGISTRATION</u>: Have the Traffic Education student mark the second box "I do not want to register to vote". If the student is 18 or 19 they can fill this section out how they please. If they do want to register to vote, they will need to sign and date again at the bottom of the page.

One of the forms is the Examiner Testing Page. This is not on the MVD external site. I was told two important things to remember on this page, besides filling in everything applicable to Traffic Education, is to always enter the date and Knowledge Test results pass or fail in order of test given. **CDTP USE ONLY:** needs to be filled out, see picture on page 4.

Once a student has passed the class and is ready to go to the MVD, they need to make a <u>Graduated Driver's License Appointment</u>. If students mark the wrong kind of appointment, the MVD will make them set a new appointment for what they need to do.

This has been a lot of information. Thanks for your time and attention to this guidance about this new format of the application. If you all follow these directions it will prevent many problems with our partners at the Montana MVD stations. 
Outstanding Traffic Education Contributor of the Year Award

Survey Results from 2022 MTEA Conference in Helena


Who pays for your conference registration? 54 responses


